

Responding to the Coronavirus

Over the past couple of weeks, it seems that lives have been turned upside down. So many regular events have been canceled. The economy has been adversely affected. Many people are living in fear. Leaders scramble to determine the appropriate response and actions at this time. A society that is used to being in charge of things now lives at the mercy of this coronavirus.



In our modern world, we are used to controlling so many things in our daily lives. People are tempted to believe that they do not need God. Recent events remind us that we cannot always control our world and our environment. A virus can arise, which is at least for a time, out of our control. The situation calls us to again place our trust in God. As believing Catholics, we turn to God at times like this. We petition God for relief for those afflicted by the virus. We petition God for good judgement for our leaders. We petition God for prudent action by all of our people. We petition God for a return to faith for those who might have wandered from God, thinking they can control their world, separate from God and accountability to God.

As I mentioned in my homily last weekend, we face this world pandemic during the season of lent, that season which calls us to repentance and to a closer relationship with God. As you face the challenges of this situation, I invite you to do so in the spirit of this season. Place your trust in God for your needs. Seek to deepen your faith relationship with God through prayer. Actually, with the extra time people will have due to the cancellation of so many activities, this is a great opportunity to spend more time in prayer, perhaps saying the rosary as a family or spending time with holy scripture. Reflect on your need of conversion and turning away from sin during this Lenten season.

As a parishioner, you also have completely free online access to FORMED. This website from Augustine Institute is brimming with many faith-filled programs, from Bible Studies, Current Topics, to Youth and Children's videos. When you logon you can view teachings on the coming Sunday's Gospel. There are also many movies, books and audio offerings.

If you haven't logged onto FORMED yet, now is the time to explore this wonderful resource.

I encourage you to follow the steps below to register:

Go to 'Formed.org' and Click on 'signup'

Click on 'I belong to a Parish or Organization'

Type in our parish zip code '68147' in the search box

and then select 'St. Bernadette Parish in Bellevue, NE'

Follow the directions from there to be filled with the Holy Spirit.

Once you register you can download the FORMED phone app and access on the go.



One of the things I have noticed is the accounts of people emptying shelves of grocery stores for in-demand items. Try not to act selfishly in hoarding these items. And be conscious of neighbors or others who might be in particular need of assistance at this time, perhaps some shut-ins. Times of crisis always offer the opportunity for reaching out in charity and occasionally acts of heroism. We are called to Christian charity at all times, but especially when there is great need in our communities. A year ago, at this time, we were experiencing great flooding in the heartland. People responded by reaching out to their neighbors at that time. May there be a similar response to those in need at this time.

At this time, all public Masses and communal celebration of the sacraments and other liturgies are indefinitely suspended. This includes Stations of the Cross during lent. We will continue to keep the church open for private prayer from 7:00 a.m. to noon and from 4:00 p.m. to 7:00 p.m. daily. I invite you to come for Eucharistic adoration or to pray the rosary or the stations of the cross privately.

We are suspending all parish meetings involving more than ten people.

Sacrament of Penance: I will continue to be available at the church on Saturdays from 3:30 to 4:30 p.m. I will station myself in the area behind the altar to take away the possibility of touching un sanitized surfaces. We are marking the church with tape to provide for people to keep an appropriate distance between one another as they wait in line for the sacrament.

Mass is available on EWTN, Cox cable channel 2 at 7:00 a.m. and 11:00 a.m. daily. Mass for Shut-ins is aired every Sunday at 10:30 a.m. on WOWT, channel 8 on Cox cable. KVSS, 102.7, local Catholic Radio, also airs a Mass at 10:30 a.m. daily and on Sundays at 7:00 a.m. and 12:00 noon. When participating in T.V. Mass I encourage you to use the Spiritual Communion Prayer found at the end of this bulletin. During lent, KVSS airs stations of the cross daily at 11:00 a.m. I urge you to pray daily the pray of St. Joseph offered to us by Archbishop Lucas. It is found on the front page.

At this time, it is very important to connect with the elderly, shut-ins and others who live alone. Be sure to reach out to those people you know in these circumstances, particularly your neighbors who may not have family nearby. All EMHC's, now unable to take communion to the homebound, should keep in touch with their people to continue to support them and to pray with them over the phone.

If anyone would like to be contacted by a fellow parishioner please call the parish office. If anyone would like to serve as an outreach minister to currently homebound parishioners please contact the parish office we will provide information and training to connect these two groups.

4. We do have automatic withdrawal for contributions set up for the 10th and/or the 20th of each month. For this option, you authorize us to draw a particular amount from your account on a regular basis. To set this up please contact Myrna Partida at the parish office or email her at mdpartida@archomaha.com. She will give you information on how to set this up.

We are also looking into other options for receiving your donations. Again thank you for your generosity.

The St. Vincent de Paul Conference of St. Bernadette Parish will continue to be active at this time. In particular, with school not in session, we are aware that some families, particularly those on free or reduced school lunches, may be in need of groceries at this time. If such of a need arises, you may call the parish office to make a request.
